Intelligence Narrative No. 133, Day Operation, 18 January 1944

Flight Commander: Major Friday.

A. 320th Bombardment Group (M).

B. At 1045 hours, 27 B-26's took off to bomb Piombino M/Y, Italy. 2 B-26's returned early; 1 with right propeller governor out, 1 engine trouble. 25 B-26's were over the target and 25 B-26's dropped 88 x 1000 lb. demolition bombs with 1/10 - .025 second delay fuses, 6 x 500 lb. demolition bombs with 6 hour delay fuses, 6 x 500 lb. demolition bombs with 12 hour delay fuses, and 6 x 500 lb. demolition bombs with 24 hour delay fuses at 1238 hours from 9500'. 25 B-26's returned at 1407 hours.

C. Results: A good concentration of bombs landed at K-1/19-20 (TC 3-124-NA). An excellent pattern of bombs covered the southern portion of the M/Y's with a few direct hits in the center of the yards. A large explosion with flames and smoke was seen in the M/Y's. Some of the cars in the M/Y's were destroyed.

D. Observations: 1. Air: a. Air Activity: None.

b. Situation: 1 or 2 wrecked a/c were seen on Grosseto A/D at 1234 from 10000'.

2. Ground: a. General: (1) 3 to 4 flashes on the ground, light in color, but not similar to firing gun batteries, were seen 1 mile east of Castiglione della Pescaia at 1236 from 10000'.

(2) A small column of smoke was seen coming from a long building in the center of Piombino at 1238 from 9500'.

(3) 5 large holes were seen in the roof of the Ilva Steel Works building at the target prior to bombing, at 1238 from 9500'.

b. Communications: 107 cars were seen in the M/Y at the target at 1238 from 9500'.

c. Flak: (1) Piombino 9500'; Porto-ferraio, Alba, 9000'.

(2) Piombino slight to moderate; Porto-ferraio slight. (3) Piombino heavy and light; Porto-ferraio heavy.

(4) Piombino heavy, accurate for altitude, inaccurate for deflection; Piombino light, inaccurate; Porto-ferraio, inaccurate as to both altitude and deflection.

(5) Piombino, continuously pointed fire; Porto-ferraio, predicted concentration.

(6) 4 heavy guns at 19/G (TC 3-124-NA); 2 heavy guns at 19/G; 2 heavy guns at 17/I; 3 heavy guns at 18/K-1; 4 heavy guns at 27/E; 4 light guns at 19/D; 1 light gun at 19/E; 1 - 4 gun light battery at 42°47'N, 10°31'E.

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Shipping: (1) The following shipping was seen in Piombino Harbor at 1238 from 9500':
(a) 1 coastal freighter on North side of mole at 21.3/0 (TC 3-124-NA).
(b) 1 coaster at North side of same mole at 21.6/N-0.
(c) 1 coastal freighter at 21-22/M.
(d) 1 coastal freighter out in harbor at 18/P-4.
(e) 1 P boat inside South mole at 16.7/P.
(f) 1 P boat against pier at 17/0.6.
(g) 1 long barge moving southwest at 17/P-4.
(h) 1 long barge at 19.2/M-N.
(i) 47 small boats in harbor at 18/M-N.
(j) 4 small barges inside South mole at 17/P.
(k) 5 small fishing boats and 19 small barges at 21-22/M.

(2) 10/15 small fishing boats were seen anchored just off Fallonica at 1237 from 10000'.

(3) 1 medium coastal vessel was seen headed North between Palmaiola Island and Alba Island at 1240 from 9000'.

3. Losses: 3 B-26's damaged by flak; 4 B-26's slightly damaged by flak; 1 crew member slightly injured.

4. Weather: a. Enroute: 5-6/10 cumulus, bases 3-4000', 150-200' thick, over Corsica and Sardinia. Less than 1/10 of same over water. Light haze. Visibility unlimited.

b. Target: CAVU. Light haze.

c. Return: Clouds dissipating over Sardinia and Corsica.

E. Routes and Altitudes: From base at 2500', 24° T for 256 statute miles to Point Ala Sparbiere, IP, climbing gradually to 10000'; bomb run, 318° M to target at 9500'; breakaway left; 245° T for 25 statute miles to 42°50'N, 10°00'E; 191° T for 120 statute miles to Cape Ferro; 193° T for 129 statute miles dropping to 2500' gradually enroute to this base.
