## Intelligence Narrative No. 163, Day Operation, 11 March 1944

Flight Commander: Lt. Rucker.

- A. 320th Bombardment Group (M).
- B. At 0819 hours, 36 B-26's of the 320th Bombardment Group (M) took off to bomb the Florence M/Y, NW, Italy. They were escorted by fighters of the 52nd Fighter Group. 1 B-26 returned early due to engine cutting out. 35 B-26's were over the target (primary) and 28 B-26's dropped 224 x 500 lb. demolition bombs (1/10-.025) on the target at 1056 hours from 8,700°. 24 x 500°lb. demolition bombs (1/10-.025) were salvoed on the target, 8 safe and 16 armed, due to rack malfunction. 4 B-26's dropped 32 x 500 lb. demolition bombs (1/10-.025) on the secondary target, Cecina RR Bridge, at 1115 hours from 7,500', I because the bombs hung up over the primary, and 3 because the flight leader thought his bombs might hit the hospital area. No bombs were returned to this base. 30 B-26's returned safely to this base at 1315 hours. 4 B-26's returned late, 3 at 1502 hours and 1 at 1645 hours after landing at Ghisonaccia, Corsica for gas. 1 B-26 returned late at 1700 hours after landing at Borgo. Corsica for gas.
- C. Results: An excellent pattern of bombs fell across the center of the is destroying 190 units of rolling stock and the N section of the C. I. S. A. Actory. Some bombs of the second Squadron also damaged the Montecatini Chemical Works. Two explosions were seen, I from the yards and I from the C.I.S.A. factory. Bombs dropped on the Cecina RR Bridge fell in good pattern with most bombs over the the W. but one or two damaging near misses.

# D. Observations: 1. Air:

a. Air Activity: None.

b. Situation:

(1) 10/12 a/c, 3/4 of which looked U/S, were seen parked parallel to hangars on Pontedera A/D at 1047 hours from 9,500'.

(2) 5/7 S/E, 3/4 M/E a/c were seen near the hangars and on the SW corner of Peretola

A/D at 1058 hours from 8.300'.

- (3) 5 S/E and 1 M/E a/c were observed on a landing strip 2 miles due S of Florence at 1055 hours from 8,900'.
  - 2. Ground:

### a. General:

- )1) The Gas Works in the target area appeared active with white smoke hanging over it.
  (2) A factory with trucks moving around it was observed at Dicimano at 1058 hours from 8.400
- (3) Factories at Poggibonsi appeared active at 1045 hours from 9.600'. b. Communications:
- (1) 263 cars and 23 hospital cars were in the target at the time of the attack and an 11 car train was moving out of the N end of the yards.

12 200 cars were seen in the S end of the main Florence M/Y I-H/8-9, cf. TC 3-150-NA, 1056 hours from 8,700'.

13) 50 cars were seen in the S end of the M/Y in Florence at G/16-17, cf. TC 3-150-MA, at 1056 hours from 8.700 .

(4) 75 Cars were observed in Signa MyY at 1053 hours from 9,700'.
(5) 60 coal cars were observed in a string on the tracks between Signa and Florence at 1059 hours from 7.700'.

(6) 100-150 cars were seen in a string on tracks just E of Empeli at 1049 hours from

7,700'.
(7) 50/75 cars were seen in Empoli M/Y at 1049 hours from 9,700'.

(8) 40/50 cars were seen in Sesto Fiorentino at 1058 hours from 8,200'.

100/150 cars were seen in sidings on tracks between Seste Fierentine and Prate at (9) 1058 hours from 8,200'.

(10) 20/25 cars were observed in Fontanella M/Y at 1047 hours from 9,700'.

(11) 40/50 oil cars were seen in Castel Fierentine at 1046 hours from 9,700'.
(12) The M/Y at Pistoia appeared full at 1100 hours from 8,000'.

(13) 6-8 M/T were headed E on road to Pontassieve from Florence at 1057 hours from

(14) 10-15 M/T were seen headed S on read between Montelupe Fiorentine and Arbaia at

1051 hours from 9.700'.

(15) 4 M/T, possibly towing heavy gums , were headed toward Florence about 5 miles W of the City at 1056 hours from 8,700'.

c. Flak: None.

d. Shipping:

- (1) 1 M/V and 4 small barges were seen anchored off the mouth of the Cecina River at 1115 hours from 7,600'.
- (2" 4 M/V were observed just 5 of the quay at Leghern at 1115 hours from 7,500'.
- 5/6 small barges and I long, slender, single stack vessel, possiblys warship, were observed in Porto Ferrajo, Elba at 1120 hours from 7,500'.

3. Losses: None.

4. Weather: Shroute: 6 to 8/10 stratocumulus, base 4,000', tops 7 to 8,000'. Broken middle and high clouds at 14,000' and above. Visibility 6 miles in the haze ..

Target: Open. 2 to 3/10 cumulus, base 6,000', tops 8,000'. Scattered middle and high clouds at 14,000' and above. Visibility 6 to 8 miles in the haze. Esturn: Strateform type clouds in thin layers varying from

3,000' to 15,000'. Very thick hase limited visibility to 3 miles.

E. Routes and Altitudes: From this base at 2,500', 13° T for 129 statute miles to C. Ferre; 0° T for 98 statute miles to Borgo for rendezvous at 7,000'; 45° T for 72 statute miles to Cecina the OP; 70° T for 19 statute miles to Volterra; 12° T for 22 statute miles to Empoli the IP, bomb run across the target at 750 MH; break slight right then left; 2220 T for 120 statute miles to point off Borge, 1800 T for 98 statute miles to C. Ferre, 193° for 129 statute miles to base, lowering gradually to 1,500'.
